## VENICE, ITALY

Venice is a city unlike any other. No matter how often you've seen it in photos and films, the real thing is even more dreamlike. With canals where streets should be, water shimmers everywhere. The fabulous palaces and churches reflect centuries of history in what was a wealthy trading center between Europe and the Orient. Getting lost in the narrow alleyways is a quintessential part of exploring Venice, but at some point you'll almost surely end up in Piazza San Marco, where tourists and locals congregate for coffee or an aperitif.

## OPATIJA, CROATIA

Stroll along Opatija's seaside promenade, and soak up the splendour, as you enjoy fresh sea air, the sight of waving yacht masts, and grand ocean-facing buildings. Historically a fashionable destination for European aristocracy, the city is just as in-demand today - with palatial structures bordering an inviting blue sea, and lush green mountains stretching around the city. Vibrant gardens, glorious weather and endless seafront combine to ensure that Croatia's original tourist destination remains one of the country's finest.

## ZADAR, CROATIA

Dalmatia's capital for more than 1,000 years, Zadar is all too often passed over by travelers on their way to Split or Dubrovnik. What they miss out on is a city of more than 73,000 that is remarkably lovely and lively despite—and, in some measure, because of—its tumultuous history. The Old Town, separated from the rest of the city on a peninsula some 4 km (2½ miles) long and just 1,640 feet wide, is bustling and beautiful: the marble pedestrian streets are replete with Roman ruins, medieval churches, palaces, museums, archives, and libraries.

## KORČULA, CROATIA

Off the coast of Croatia in the southern Adriatic Sea lie some thousand islands and the largest of them, Korčula, is considered the most beautiful. With an average of 3,000 hours of sunshine per annum, which guarantees a wide assortment of Mediterranean vegetation, it is not difficult to understand why seasoned travelers compare Korčula to a latter-day Eden. Separated from the mainland by a channel of only one mile, Korčula's main town, named the same as the island, ranks among the best preserved medieval towns in the Mediterranean.

## KOTOR, MONTENEGRO

Located in Bokor Kotorska (Kotor Bay), Europe's most southerly fjord, Kotor lies 50 miles (80 km) west of Podgorica, the capital of Montenegro, from which it is separated by a belt of dramatic, rugged mountains. Listed as a UNESCO World Heritage site, Kotor's medieval Stari Grad (Old Town) is enclosed within well-preserved defensive walls built between the 9<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries and presided over by a proud hilltop fortress. In the Middle Ages, as Serbia's chief port, Kotor was an important economic and cultural center with its own highly-regarded schools of stone-masonry and iconography.

## BRINDISI, ITALY

Life continues in Brindisi as if the 21<sup>st</sup> century hadn't arrived. Visually, the landscape is as stunning as one would expect in southern Europe. Villages set on sunlit hilltops rise like islands above a rolling landscape of olive groves and vineyards. The coastline is a striking mixture of ruggedly beautiful cliffs and grottoes interspersed with a scattering of long, sandy beaches. Together with the wealth of historical artefacts and spectacular landscapes, Brindisi is one of Italy's best kept secrets.

## VALLETTA, MALTA

Malta's capital, the minicity of Valletta, has ornate palaces and museums protected by massive fortifications of honey-color limestone. Houses along the narrow streets have overhanging wooden balconies for people-watching from indoors. Generations ago they gave housebound women a window on the world of the street. The main entrance to town is through the City Gate (where all bus routes end), which leads onto Triq Repubblika (Republic Street), the spine of the grid-pattern city and the main shopping street.

## PALERMO, SICILY, ITALY

Once the intellectual capital of southern Europe, Palermo has always been at the crossroads of civilization. Favorably situated on a crescent-shaped bay at the foot of Monte Pellegrino, it has attracted almost every culture touching the Mediterranean world. To Palermo's credit, it has absorbed these diverse cultures into a unique personality that is at once Arab and Christian, Byzantine and Roman, Norman and Italian.


## CAPRI, ITALY

Popular since Roman times when the emperors built their villas on Capri, this island is surely one of the world's most famous and beautiful spots. Visiting Capri, it is easy to see why the ancient Romans fell in love with this place 2,000 years ago - the craggy mountains, the sea caves and grottos and the brilliantly colored flowers cast a magic spell then and still capture the admiration of today's travelers. There are sleek yachts moored in the deep blue waters of the bays, and beautiful villas and tiny villages cling to steep slopes.

## CIVITAVECCHIA, ITALY

Rome is a heady blend of artistic and architectural masterpieces, classical ruins, and opulent baroque churches and piazzas. The city's 2,700-year-old history is on display wherever you look. Julius Caesar and Nero, the Vandals and the Popes, Raphael and Caravaggio, Napoléon and Mussolini—these and countless other luminaries and villains have left their mark on the city. Today Rome's formidable legacy is kept alive by its people, their history knit into the fabric of their everyday lives. Raphael-esque teenage girls zip through traffic on their motorini; priests in flowing robes talk on cell phones striding through medieval piazzas. Modern Rome has one foot in the past, one in the present—a fascinating stance that allows you to tip back an espresso while gazing at a Bernini fountain, then hop on the metro to your next attraction.
